
Looking back at this year, what stands out is the amazing rainy season we've had, providing much-needed water and relief, turning this country into a magnificent wonderland... What a blessing!



Equine Odontoclastic Tooth Resorption and Hypercementosis – an overview

Equine odontoclastic tooth resorption and hypercementosis (EOTRH) is a progressive, painful disease predominantly affecting incisors and canines but can affect cheek teeth as well. Whilst it most commonly affects horses over 15 years old, it can be found in horses as young as 10 years old. Geldings are more frequently affected than mares.

The underlying cause is unknown and likely multifactorial and there is research ongoing to establish a cause.

It is a progressive disease with no known prevention. Clinical signs of EOTRH are variable depending on the stage and severity of the disease. Horses may not exhibit clinical signs in the early stages. Since EOTRH has a gradual onset, owners may not recognize the clinical signs until the condition becomes painful for the horse.

Clinical signs include gingival inflammation, tooth discolouration, not wanting to bite down on carrots and difficulty grazing. In more advanced stages findings include gingival recession and/or hyperplasia, subgingival swelling, bulbous enlargement of teeth and draining tracts appearing around the tooth. Teeth may fracture or become loose and displaced/fall out.

Affected horses may exhibit halitosis, drooling, head shaking, quidding, and weight loss.

Diagnosis is confirmed with radiography using incisor x-ray biteplates.

Extraction of affected teeth is the treatment of choice. This can range for 1-2 teeth to all 12 incisors. This should be performed by a specifically trained veterinarian using specialised equipment under sedation as well as regional and local anaesthesia.

The prognosis after surgery is favourable. Most horses are eating well within a few hours post-op and completely healed within 6 weeks with an overall improvement in quality of life. Owners, while occasionally reluctant at first to proceed, report positive changes to temperament and condition of their horse even when only 1-2 teeth are extracted.

Client education is important as long-term practical management is required, for example not retiring the horse on a farm with only grazing unless soft grass guaranteed.

Two cases in pictures:

Jazz. 20-year-old TB gelding.


Reluctant to bite off carrots but otherwise no other issues that owner was aware of. EOTRH suspected at routine dental and confirmed with radiographs. Extracted all 12 incisors and 304. Recovered fully after 8 weeks and enjoyed a good quality of life until his death due to unrelated causes aged 24.



Gingival recession and hyperplasia for all incisors. 304 fractured.



Maxillary incisors – resorption and some hypercementosis



Mandibular incisors and canines.



4 weeks post op. Mandible sockets fully granulated by 8 weeks.

Antarah -22-year-old Warmblood gelding.

Incidental finding on routine dental. Extracted 102,103, 202, 203, 303 and 403 together. 304 and 404 looked slightly affected on xrays but opted to be conservative. 2 weeks post-op sockets all healing well apart from 303 which still had a lot of purulent discharge. Extracted 304 on that day and within 2 weeks both sockets had caught up to the other extraction sites.

Owner noted 6 weeks post op that he is his old self again. Neighs to greet her again, energetic when ridden and generally happier. She had put his "depression" down to aging.

At 6 month check-up a few weeks ago Antarah has gained weight and top-line and sockets look perfect. We will continue to monitor the remaining canines and incisors as they may need to be extracted at some stage.
